be started. The continuance of the new structure will be pushed ahead as rapidly as possible. It is figured that there is about a year's work ahead for the contractors and others who will put up the new twin sheds. The Great Wall Simultaneously with the removal of the excavating equipment the Browning Company began placing the equipment for the concrete gans. One of the first big operations will be the erection of the big wall that is to extend from Second to Third street to retain the railroad embankment. The laying of some sewers and the re-arranging of some water piping will follow. Excavation for some of the sewer lines is already under way. City Commissioner Harry F. Bowman has permitted the railroad company to make what changes in the Mulberry street pipe line as are necessary. The six-inch pipe that extended from Third to Front on the south side of Mulberry will be cut off and the water will be switched in to the new six-inch main that is to be extended between Third and Front streets on the north side of Mulberry. This will be done at the company's expense. When this work is finished new connections will be made in South Second below Race in order to furnish water to the gas plant. A water main will be built up the eastern side of the track sidings from Race street to the plant in front of the cutting off of the main that now extends through Meadow Lane and connects at Second and Washington streets. Taylor's Splendid Bargain The disused gas main that extended out Meadow Lane to connect at Second will be removed section by section with the aid of a steam shovel and as soon as the new pipe now being laid through the Second street subway, is connected up. Of the thousands of yards of earth that were scooped from the freight sites, nearly half of it went to the city. For 7,000 yards of this city didn't pay a cent. Commissioner M. Harvey Taylor having secured this much for dumping over the river bank from Paxton to Dock streets without a cent of cost. This was because of the short haul. Because of the long haul to North Front street the city had to pay twenty-six and two-thirds cents a yard for the material "in place," that was used to fill out the river embankment from Calder to Maclay streets. Contractors throughout the city were amazed at Mr. Taylor's good business stroke in getting the dirt so cheaply—just the bare cost of hauling by the motor trucks—as Stucker Brothers' Construction Company which excavated for the subways at Second and Front streets wanted seventy cents a yard for the earth. In Other Parts of the City While the freight station job is being rushed to a finish other city improvement work is being pushed along as rapidly as the weather will permit. Work has been resumed on the construction of the entrance to Reservoir Park; the construction of the bridge across Spring creek in the Cameron parkway is under way; out in Twentieth street the sewer work is being hustled along; so is the Geiger and Third street sewer job; grading of Market street from Twenty-first to the eastern city line will be started within a few days, while William Opperman has already begun excavations for the putting down of the sewer systems in the business district. Wildwood Park driveway which had been closed for several days to permit of improvements, is now open to automobile and other traffic from Maclay street to the breast of the dam. The remainder of the highway is still in course of renovation. Fourteen carloads of ashes were used for the rehabilitation of the road. When Harrisburg Rolls Up Its Sleeves Paving operations will be resumed as soon after April 1 as the weather will permit. Derry street from Twenty-third to the eastern city line and Market street from Nineteenth to Twenty-first streets will be the first highways to occupy the contractor's attention. Street Repair Contractor Charles P. Walter is busy patching up the streets preparatory to surrendering his five-year contract with the city April 1. On April 7 bids for the construction of the city's own asphalt plant will be opened by Commissioner Lynch. Stucker Brothers' Construction Company and the West Construction Company, contractors on the river wall and the Paxton creek improvements, respectively, are getting their equipment in readiness to resume work early in April. Harrisburg, figuratively speaking, is shedding its coat and rolling up its sleeves for a very, very busy season. WOMAN SHOT AS SPY Luneville, France, March 25, 5:29 A. M.—Marguerite Schmidt, a French woman sentenced to death as a spy after being court-martialed, was shot yesterday after the troops of the garrison had been drawn up to witness the execution. By her own admission at her trial the woman accepted two hundred francs (\$40) from the Germans to enter the French lines and obtain information. RUSS WILL HAVE 180,000 FOR OTHER ENGAGEMENT By Associated Press Geneva, via Paris, March 25, 10:3 A. M.—The Austrian government admits according to dispatches received here from Vienna, that its losses in the surrender of Przemysl were six gunboats, about 2,500 officers and official and 10,000 men. The Austrians on their part, however, that most of the guns of the fortress were rendered useless and that all the ammunition was destroyed.
