public playground. The need is a real one; the matter has already been long delayed. It will cost money, but money can scarcely be more wisely expended.

Professor Brehm pointed out how cities are developing playgrounds and how some of the middle western cities never buy less than fifteen or twenty acres for the purpose.

"When I say that the people of the West End heartily endorse the plan to purchase this site I believe I can say I voice the sentiment of the whole West End Improvement Association."

"What I did say was that I think Hoffman's Woods would make an ideal park, one of the best in the country if it could be secured. But it can't be secured by the city. Furthermore, it would do for a park only and we meant a playground."
