Pneumonia caused one-eighth of all the deaths in Pennsylvania during the mouth of January according to reports of vital and mortuary statistics for the first month of 1915 which have just been compiled by the State Department of Health. Including all diseases, accidents and all forms of violence there were 9.609 deaths in the Keystone State in January of which 1235 are directly attributed to pneumonia. This is an unusually high number and it is interesting to note that during January the deaths from tuberculosis were 936, diphtheria 179, typhoid fever 76 and scarlet fever only 36.

Cancer claimed 505 victims and Bright's disease \$44, these allments having high figures. There were 589 deaths in early infancy, 40 deaths from measles, 35 from whooping cough and 2 from malaria. Eighty were killed in mines and there were 75 suicides, while \$1 died from railway injuries of various kinds. Other form, of violence caused 436 deaths.
