



Early's skull was frac-tured and the physicians think he con-tracted pneumonia from being rushed to the hospital on an open auto truck after the accident. Mr. Early was 42 years old and came to Carlisle from Palmyra about twenty years ago to take charge of the Pennsylvania House and conducted that hotel for about ten years. Carlisle, Pa., April, 6.—A barn on the farm of Harvey Sheaffer, con-ducted by his son, Walter W. Sheaffer, near Carlisle Springs, was totalily de-stroyed by fire about 5 o'clock this morning. The contents, consisting of hay, feed and farming implements, were destroyed, but the horses and ocatile were sotten out, although two cows were so badly burned they had to be killed.
