A big restric-tion upon the retail sale of any liquor containing more than six per cent. of alcohol is provided in a bill introduced by Mr. Barnett, York. The bill makes it unlawful to "sell at retail any dis-tilled alcoholi liquor or any alco-holic liquor containing more than six per cent. of alcohol in any bottle, jug or other container except upon the written prescription of a physician licensed to practice medicine in Pennsylvania." The prescription when presented shall be cancelled and shall not be used again. The penalty for violation is \$100 fine. Mr. Bennett also presented a bill inquors. Forfeiture of license and \$1,000 fine is made the penalty for vio-lation and the license is made ineli-gible to manufacture or sell liquors for five years. Another liquor bill was presented by Mr. Weimer, Lebanon, prohibiting re-tail sales of liquor to be taken from the premises in a vessel containing more than cne quart.
