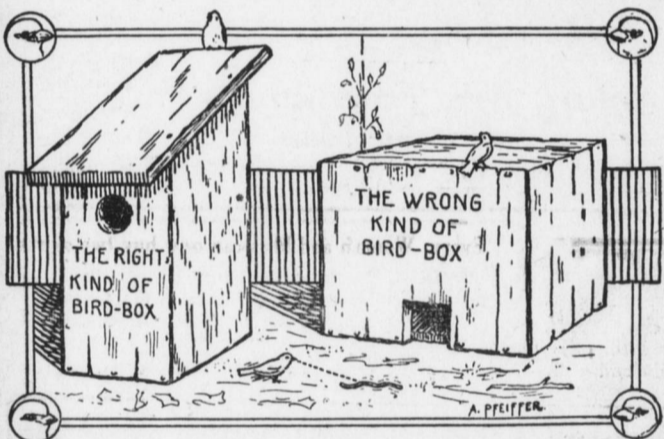

are a great success on private estates and in home gardens. If Harrisburg started them officially it would probably be the first city to do so.

But the one drawback to comfortable bird houses is the certainty of them being crowded by sparrows to the exclusion of song birds unless sparrow traps are provided.

Hole-Nesters Arriving
The time of year has arrived when preparations should be made for constructing and erecting the boxes for the hole-nesting birds when they begin to arrive from the south.

As yet, however, there is a very hazy conception of how to make the proper kind of bird houses and five out of six made by children are entirely worthless. A child's conception of a bird house is naturally that of a human dwelling with the door or entrance hole placed on a level with the floor.

Bearing on this point, special attention is called to a most useful publication recently issued by the United States Department of Agriculture (Farmers' Bulletin No. 609) entitled "Bird Houses and How to Build Them," and written by Ned Dearborn, of the Biological Survey.

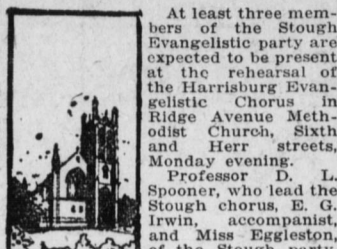
