## ZION CHURCH CHOIR IN EASTER PROGRAM

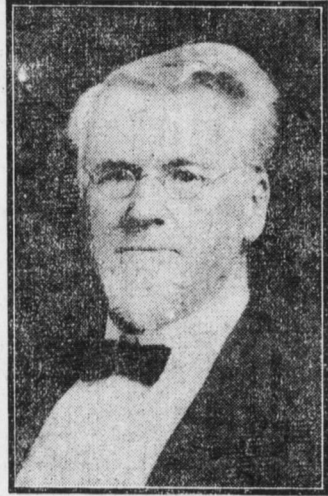
By Special Request Will Repeat Beautiful Music Arranged For Last Sunday
