SUBSTANTIAL GAINS IN IMPORTANT ISSUES

U. S. Steel Again Prominent Feature; Buoyancy of Yesterday Continued

New York, April 10. — The buoyancy which marked yesterday's trading on the Stock Exchange continued with unabated vigor at the opening of today's business. Substantial gains were recorded in all important issues. United States Steel was again the prominent feature, opening at 122 1/2, against yesterday's close of 121 1/2. Advances of one to three points were noted in the department of American Smelting and Refining, Canadian Pacific, New York Central, and various specialties. Bethlehem Steel was the only marked decline, closing at 122 1/2, declining two points. Much of the further advance was attributed to urgent covering in short contracts.

Appetite of Speculative Public Again Satisfied

New York, April 10. — The course of today's feverishly active stock market indicated that the appetite of the speculative public had been satisfied for a time. Gains of one to three points were registered in the United States Steel retaining its leadership by ascending to the high level of 122 1/2. Schwab Unable to Give Reason For Big Jump in Bethlehem Steel Shares

Bethlehem, Pa., April 10.—Charles M. Schwab and his associates express an extraordinary rise in Bethlehem Steel common stock on Wall Street, but scout entirely the rumor that it is being bought by a syndicate of German sympathizers in order to obtain control and stop manufacture of war orders for the Allies.

Mr. Schwab, who on Monday returned from White Sulphur Springs, denies any knowledge of the stock operations and if he knows anything about them or the alleged German plan he has not said a word about them to his closest intimates.

Chandler Shiro First Seven-Passenger Model

In his anxiety to obtain delivery of the first seven-passenger Chandler Shiro to be shipped from the factory, C. A. Quigley, Utah distributor for the Chandler Company, willingly paid the \$100 express charges on a rush shipment to Salt Lake City. Mr. Quigley, who recently signed as a Chandler dealer, determined to have his demonstrating car on exhibition during the week of the annual Mormon Church conference in Salt Lake City. When he was informed that his car, the first of the new seven-passenger Chandlers, was to be shipped by freight on April 2, he immediately wired the factory to send the car by Wells-Fargo express. Following the shipment of the first car, Chandler production has rapidly reached the railroad point, and over 1,000 cars will be shipped in April. According to President F. C. Chandler, the big Cleveland factory of the company will turn out over 1,500 cars per month from now on.
