President H. A. Boyer, secretary D. D. Hammelbaugh and City Superintendent F. E. Downes are all in the eastern corner of the State looking up possible candidates for the principalship to succeed W. S. Steele and the only director of the school who would talk on the question today was Millard F. Saul, a brother of Miss Saul and uncle of Bertram. Director Saul denied any effort on his part to have his nephew appointed.

Japanese Crew Honors Men Who Died on F-4

Honolulu, April 14.—The air command tank that is to be used in the attempt to raise the wreck of the submarine F-4, was placed yesterday by divers Drellishak and Crilly. It was subjected to a pressure of 105 pounds per square inch, which is equivalent to submergence of 25 feet below the surface, and the results were reported satisfactory.

Racing Bill Defeated and Then Reconsidered

The bill introduced by Senator Catlin, of Luzerne, creating a state racing commission and legalizing pari-mutuel betting, was defeated in the Senate by a vote of 19 yeas and 15 nays, the measure lacking six votes to pass it.

WILL ASK APPROVAL OF PLAN FOR STEPS OF MARKET STREET

Lynch to Submit Scheme For Closing Market Street Gap to Public Works Board Tonight

Approval of the plan to close the unsightly gap in the river front wall at Market street by continuing the construction of the line of steps across the opening will be asked of the Board of Public Works this evening by City Commissioner William H. Lynch, superintendent of streets and public improvements.

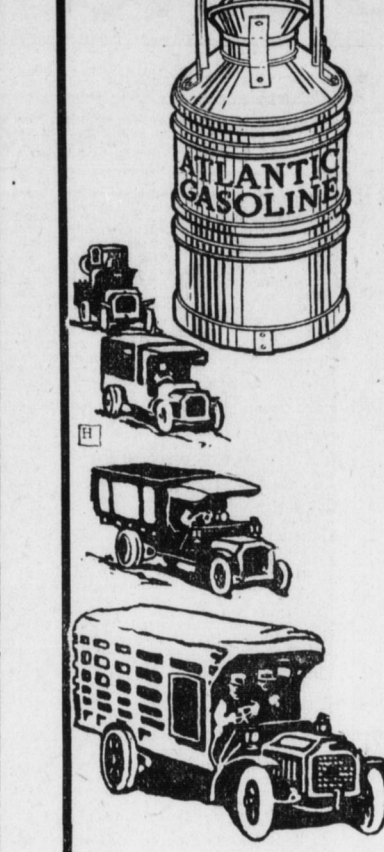
Divorce Colony Rouses Dear Old Reno Again
