At the time the fire was discov-ered the boys and girls of the Nursery Home had just started dinner, while the others had been dismissed from the dining room a minute before. The children going to the playground saw the smoke pouring from the second story window and gave the alarm. Enos Wenrich, superintendent of the home, had the blaze under control when the fire companies responded to the alarm. On the way to the fire the horses of the Mount Pleasant chemical wagon slipped on the railroad tracks at Eighteenth and Derry streets and fell. The left front wheel of the wagon was smashed and the horses sustained severe lacerations and bruises on the front legs. This is the second fire that broke out in the home to-day. The first one was disovered by one of the nurses, who was going up to the second floor with the children who had just finished breakfast. Mr. Wenrich ex-tinguished the blaze with chemicals.
