2D DEGREE VERDICT FOR MORGENTHAU

Supreme Court Reverses Judge Sadler's Decision in Case of Man Who Killed John Rupp

Special to The Telegraph. Carlisle, Pa., April 18.—This morning the State Supreme Court, in session at Philadelphia, handed down a decision in the appeal of Max Morgenthau versus Cumberland County, murder, reversing the decision of the Cumberland county court and remitting the case to the lower court for resentencing of the appellant.

Morgenthau, a Harrisburg man, shot and killed John Rupp, a farmer, living near Mechanicsburg, while Morgenthau was stealing chickens at the farm and Rupp detected him early in the morning.

The district attorney of the county stated to-day that the matter would come up at the May term and that the Commonwealth would use every effort to secure the maximum penalty of twenty years.

CHILDREN IN NURSERY HOME DISCOVER FIRE

Charge of the Nursery Home children, who were taken to the Industrial Home after their building was burned, said that she, too, believes that children playing with matches started the fire.

A rigid investigation will be made to find the children who started the fire. At the time the fire was discovered the boys and girls of the Nursery Home had just started dinner, while the mothers had been dismissed from the dining room a minute before. The children going to the playground saw the smoke pouring from the second story window and gave the alarm.

FRANK DOOMED TO PAY DEATH PENALTY

Established modes of procedure have been accorded to him. "In the opinion of this court," said Justice Pitney, "he is not shown to have been deprived of any right guaranteed to him by the fourteenth amendment, or any other provision of the constitution of laws of the United States; on the contrary, he has been convicted and is now held in custody under due process of law within the meaning of the constitution."
