The new regulations made by the mail service officials affect the men in service whose salaries are under \$1,200 annually. The clerks who have been ordered to leave this place will not move their families at once. It was stated late to-day that the clerks expect these regulations to be repealed in a short time.

EX-SENIORS TO GIVE PLAY

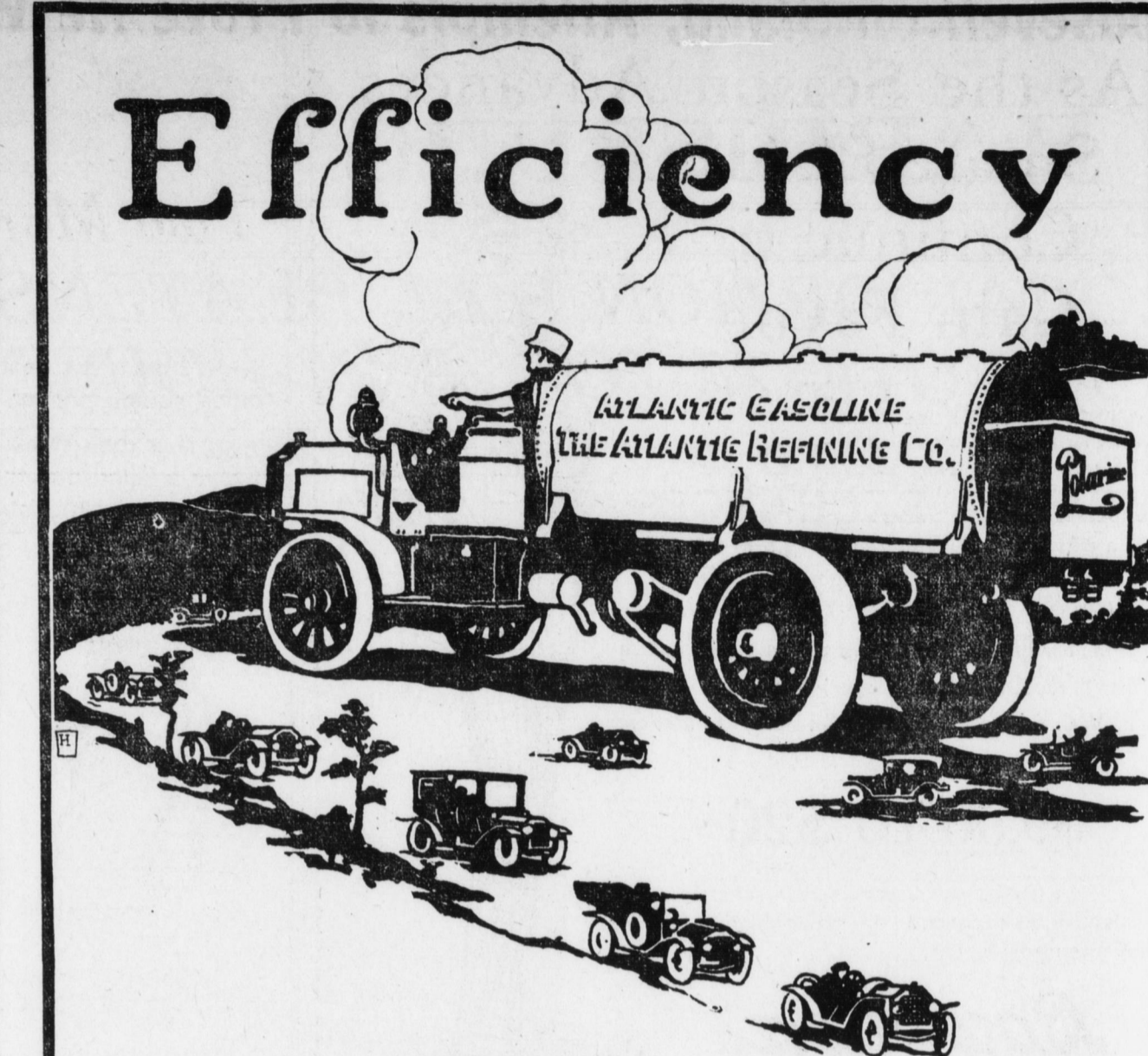
