TO SELL HISTORIC HOME. Residence of Governor Snyder at Selinsgrove May Be Preserved. Sunbury, Pa., April 26.—The historic Allean property, at Selinsgrove, known as the home of Simon Snyder, one of the State's best known Governors, is to be sold and an effort will be made to buy it for historical purposes. It was said here to-day. It was built and occupied by Governor Snyder in 1816, and is the same as it was the day it was built, as to architecture, although modern improvements have been put in.

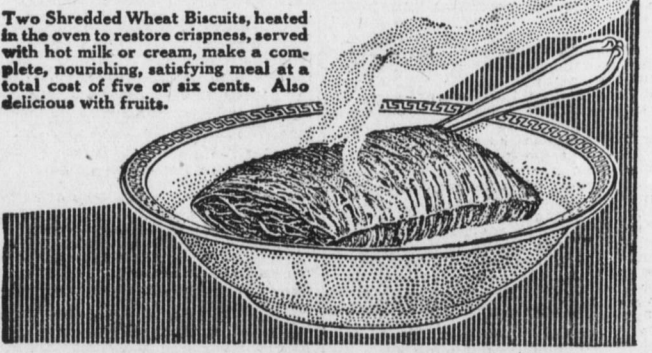
