UNDERWRITERS CAN CONDUCT BRANCHES

Attorney General Gives a Decision Clarifying the Statutes on the Subject

Telephone Arguments Governor Signs Bill to Pay the Stewart Judgment Obtained in the Local Courts

In an opinion given to the State Board of Underwriters, Attorney General Brown today has decided whether an underwriter licensed by the State authority as a competent person can establish a branch office by holding that the person and not the place of business is licensed.

The question arose in Philadelphia whether a licensed underwriter could have branches in the county designated in his license or through the State and whether duplicates of the licenses could be issued for the branches. Mr. Brown decides all questions in the affirmative. He says: "The primary object and main purpose of the legislation is to safeguard the health and welfare of the citizens of the State by licensing only such persons to engage in this business who possess the necessary knowledge, skill and ability to do so."

For the Muskrat.—Muskrats will be brought under the protection of law if a bill reported to the House to-day passes the House. It provides that muskrats may be taken only between March 1 and November 15 and that their "houses" may not be harmed. Owners of dams which may kill them. The game muskrats have not acted upon the bill to protect skunks presented at the same time as the Pennsylvania bill.

Stewart Bill Approved.—The Governor last night approved the bill appropriating \$617 to pay the judgment by Robert Stewart in his suit against the State for work done in Capitol Park some years ago.

Telephone Case Up.—The Public Service commission to-day began a three-day hearing on the telephone rate schedule. The Bell Telephone entered objections and will be followed by independents.

Speak on Tax Bill.—Mayor Armstrong and Councilmen Dillinger, Woodburn and Gorman are here to speak on behalf of the city of Pittsburgh on the tax law repealer. The Senate committee in charge is giving them a hearing to-day.

Deeds Report Filed.—The report of the commission to investigate methods of recording deeds was presented to the House to-day and filed. It covers a number of states.

Forty-five more prosecutions for the sale of milk cream not up to State standards were ordered by Commissioner James Foust to-day.
