

The herd now numbers eighteen. The calves get on their feet as soon as they are born, and can run and swim as well as the adults. Colonel Trexler's collection of bison is the largest this side of Yellowstone Park. The growth of the herd is remarkable. He bought five in 1911 and has lost three adults by death.
