

ARE NOT SOUGH
End of April Finds Smaller Amount
in Cash Than at the Close of
March Business

The statement of the April operations of the State Treasury shows that the aggregate of the balances at the end of April is \$600,000 less than that at the close of March business. The statement of April business is as follows: Receipts—General fund, \$914,462.96; sinking fund, \$128,854; school fund, \$2,876,886; motor vehicle licenses, \$227,444; total, \$4,147,653.86. Payments—General fund, \$1,678,674.10; motor license fund, \$100,000; total, \$1,778,674.10. Balances—General fund, \$4,485,699.38; sinking fund, \$814,557.59; school fund (uninvested), \$9,181,241; motor license fund, \$898,072. Total balance at end of April, \$6,179,576.56; total balance at end of March, \$6,781,491.95.

Public Service.—The Public Service Commission will hear the complaint of the Philadelphia Milk Exchange against the rates of the Pennsylvania railroad for hauling milk in vicinity of Philadelphia when it meets here Tuesday for the first May session. Fourteen rate cases from various parts of the State are scheduled for one week, while over twenty applications for approval of contracts of various kinds, abolition of grade crossings and for incorporation of electric jitneys, taxicab and traction companies are listed. Among the eastern cases for abolition of grade crossings is for Keim street, Potomac, where the Philadelphia and Reading proposes to place an undergrade.

Encampment Orders.—Formal designation of the places and times of the encampment of the National Guard is made in general orders issued to-day by Adjutant General Stewart. Mt. Gretna has been selected for the first brigade from July 10 to 17 and the Third and Fourth brigades from July 9 to 16, while the Second will encamp with the Fourth and the signal corps company at Indiana, August 7 to 14. The Mt. Gretna encampment will be as a provisional division under command of Major General C. B. Dougherty. The joint camps will be as follows: First Cavalry, Mt. Gretna, July 10 to 17; Engineers, Belvoir, Va., August 8 to 17; Batteries A, B, C and D, Tobyhanna, August 8 to 17, and Field Troops, Tobyhanna, August 8 to 17.

New Hat Order.—Announcement is made at the National Guard headquarters that an issue of United States army service semifit brimmed hats will be made for the National Guard, the State militia during June. Requisitions must be made for the hats before June 1, and none will be filled after June 3.

Board to Meet.—The State Industrial Board will hold hearings on the proposed rule to prohibit employment of any one under 16 in tobacco factories on Friday and Saturday of next week. The Friday hearings will be held at Boyertown and Reading and on Saturday at Wilkes-Barre. Visits will be paid to tobacco factories in each place.

Supreme Court.—The May session of the Supreme Court will be held in Harrisburg commencing May 24. The list will include State, Federal and central counties with a few transferred from other districts. A special sitting of the Dauphin county court for the hearing of State cases will be held at Pottsville.

New Complaint.—A complaint was filed with the Public Service Commission to-day by the Electrical Commission's Adjustment Company of Philadelphia against the Philadelphia Electric Company in which discrimination is charged. The complainant company, which audits light and power bills and combines properties for the purpose of securing better electricity, applied to the respondent for a combination contract, known as a blanket contract, for various consumers of electricity in the city of Philadelphia. The application was refused and it is alleged that the respondent has already issued similar contracts to certain preferred consumers and has advertised such combination rate in their schedule which has been approved by the Public Service Commission.

Attended Conference.—L. R. Palmer, chief inspector, was at Allentown to attend the inspectors' conference.

Penn Conservation League Is Assured River Island Will Not Be Given Away
The Pennsylvania Conservation League has taken up the city's campaign to prevent the leasing of the island in the river opposite Ketter street to B. J. H. Douglas and preservation of the bit of ground by the city. Bishop J. H. Darlington declared to-day that the league has had assurance from Governor Brumbaugh that he will not sign any permission granting the use of the island to the applicant. This will establish a precedent in the Commonwealth, it is believed, and provide a way whereby Harrisburg, as well as other municipalities can acquire land of this character to ruse as parks, bathing houses and by canoes.

Central Seniors to Give Play for Steele Memorial
Members of the Senior class at the Central High school are busy making final preparations for the memorial play to be given probably during the week of commencement. At present a little mystery prevails as to just what the play will be. It is said that the students have chosen a college play to present to the public. Forty characters, all students of the Senior class at the high school, will participate. The pupils are being trained by Miss Annael Swartz, elocution instructor at the school, and who is well-known because of the many auto accidents she has trained for contests during the past few years. The money derived from the play will be used for the purpose of placing in the school a memorial in honor of the late Professor William S. Steele.

Announcement was made this morning by C. M.
