## Crack in Liberty Bell Is Growing Larger

Philadelphia, May 5.—The crack in the Liberty Bell is growing larger on account of the handling which it has received this week in preparing for its shipment to California.

The discovery has just been made by one of the most prominent metallurgical engineers in Philadelphia. His announcement comes on the very eve of the shipment of Philadelphia's most priceless historical relic on its 2,000-mile trip to the Pacific coast, where it is to be exhibited at the Panama-Pacific Exposition. City councils, which agreed to let the famous bell go on a trip so perilous to its safety, have not yet learned of the new menace to the bell's existence. The special councilman committee which is to accompany the sacred relic on its trip announced its itinerary in detail yesterday.
