Philadelphia, May §.—The crack in the Liberty Bell is growing larger on account of the handling which it has received this week in preparing for its shipment to California.

The discovery has just been made by one of the most prominent metallyrgical engineers in Philadelphia. His announcement comes on the very eve of the shipment of Philadelphia's most priceless historical relic on a 3,000-mile trip to the Pacific coast, where it is to be exhibited at the Panama-Pacific Exposition.
