**Election Bills Undergo Changes; May Be Amended**

When the amended copies of the bill supposed to repeal the provision of law, providing for election of national presidential preferences were printed to-day it was found the House elections committee had restored the present features of the act on this subject. It also put back the proviso that nominations can still be made by nomination papers.

The principal thing this bill does is to allow the election of national committeemen at the meeting for organization of the state committees. Under this provision the successor of Henry G. Wasson, of Pittsburgh, who has put in as national committeeman by William Plinn when he left the Republican party, could be elected before the national committee meets part of the Republican national convention next year.

Evidently a mistake was made by the elections committee in reporting Senate bill 539, which repeats the section of the Baker ballot law relating to making nominations by nomination papers. As it is not believed the Governor will approve this measure, it likely will be sent back to committee. The measure the committee apparently intended to put out was Senate 540, permitting the printing of the occupation on the ballot where the candidates have the same or similar surnames. The other election bills passed on first reading to-day give the Republicans first place on the ballot, permit the organization of new parties before the primaries, fix all Fall registration days in odd-numbered years in first and second class cities in September and require the payment of fees to witnesses summoned to appear before registration commissioners in first and second class cities when the subpoena is served.

**Evangelistic Chorus to Rehearse Tomorrow**

Members of the Harrisburg Evangelistic Chorus will hold a rehearsal tomorrow evening in the Ridge Avenue Methodist Church. The rehearsal will be devoted to music which will be used in a summer concert. Special orchestra work will be a feature.

On Monday evening the chorus will go to New Cumberland to participate in the dedication services of the New Cumberland Church of God. Since the last rehearsal of the chorus about six delegations have visited shut-ins of the city. Plans are being made for several more of these trips.

C. F. Clippinger, leader of the chorus, is making arrangements to have the members take a trip to Steelton next week to the Hills evangelistic campaign services being held there.

**WOMEN PLEAD WITH STATE OFFICIALS**

Ask For Consideration For the State Village For Feeble Minded in Union County

A delegation representing the 30,000 clubwomen of the state appealed to Governor M. G. Brumbaugh yesterday and gained his interest in the bill providing for an appropriation to the Village for Feeble-Minded Women of Child-Bearing Age in Union county.

The women were received by the Governor in the Executive Mansion. Mrs. Edward M. Biddle, of Carlisle, former president of the State Federation, led the delegation and told the Governor that the women of the state are aroused because they believe the Legislature will adjourn without making provision for the custodial care of the army of feeble-minded women. Mrs. Biddle related the history of the movement which led the last Legislature to appropriate \$10,000 to secure a site for the village. This site, she declared, has been secured, plans made for the erection of the buildings and a survey of the state made which shows that besides several thousand women who are at large there are about 800 on the waiting lists of institutions which care for the feeble-minded, 600 in insane asylums and almshouses and 100 more in the jails and penal institutions of the state.

The Governor, after explaining the limitations which have been put upon the appropriations committee by the decrease of the state's revenue, assured the women of his interest in the proposition. He told them he would use his influence to see what can be done with the committee and asked them to call on James F. Woodward, chairman of the House appropriations committee.

Mr. Woodward, after listening to the women, gave the same assurance that the Governor had given them. He told them that he had deferred making an appropriation to the village, hoping that the Legislature will pass some of the bills which are pending to increase the state revenue. Mrs. Biddle made an appeal for even a limited sum to keep the place developing.

**SUPERIOR COURT LAW IS CHANGED**

**Continuous Service to Be the Rule in Determining Seniority of Commission**

Governor Brumbaugh has approved the Graham House bill amending the Superior Court act of 1895 so that the rank, priority and seniority of the judges shall be determined by "continuous length of service" as a member of the court. The bill also provides that the court may at its discretion designate two of the members to write opinions during the sessions and that these members shall not be required to sit at hearings and remove the mandatory provision that the court must meet at least once a year in Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Harrisburg, Scranton and Williamsport, providing that the place of sittings may be optional with the court. Another provision is that the compensation of provisionists shall be as authorized by the act of 1909.

Approval was given by the Governor to the House bill providing that an attorney shall have a lien for his compensation upon his client's cause of action, claim or counter claim which shall attach to any award, verdict, order or other form of judgment. The bill also provides that the lien shall not be affected by any compromise or settlement before or after judgment.

The Governor also signed the bill prohibiting the use or sale of any balloons made or intended to contain fire for purposes of ascension. This measure will not apply to any balloon in which a person ascends, but is intended to forbid the paper balloons so much used at night.

Other bills approved were:

Senate bill providing a chief bookkeeper for the Auditor General's Department at a salary of \$2,500, an assistant chief bookkeeper at \$2,000, two bookkeepers and an additional traveling auditor at \$1,800 each.

Senate bill supplementing act of 1905 by providing that debts of municipalities consolidated shall be paid by the consolidated city and for the levying of a uniform tax to pay it.

House bill authorizing payment from state funds of cost of transferring insane persons on orders of the State Board of Charities or committee on lunacy.

House bill making any person, firm or corporation liable for cost of extinguishing fires which may occur in second class cities through their criminal intent or willful negligence or where they have not complied with any ordinance or regulation.
