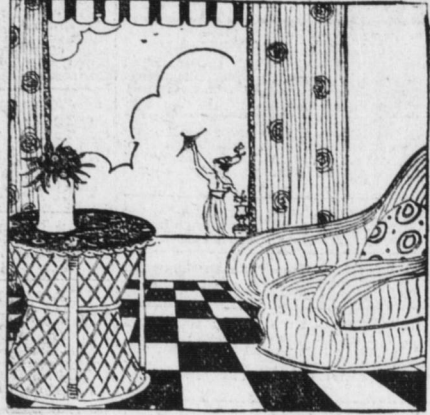

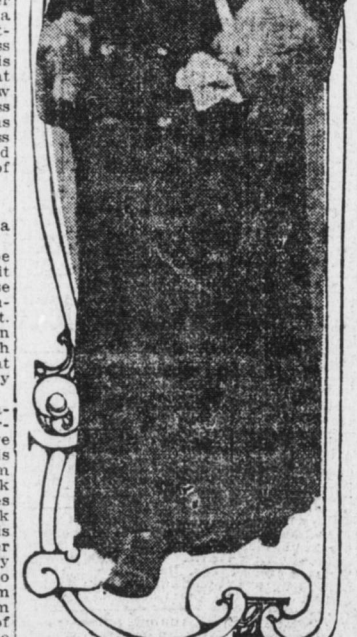

Frederick M. Barton, a great-grandson of the Rev. Thomas Barton, the missionary who represented the society "in this part of the Colony" these many score years ago, made the address of the afternoon. Special cars carried the convention folk to and from the burial ground.
