Bowling Prizes For Tournament Winners

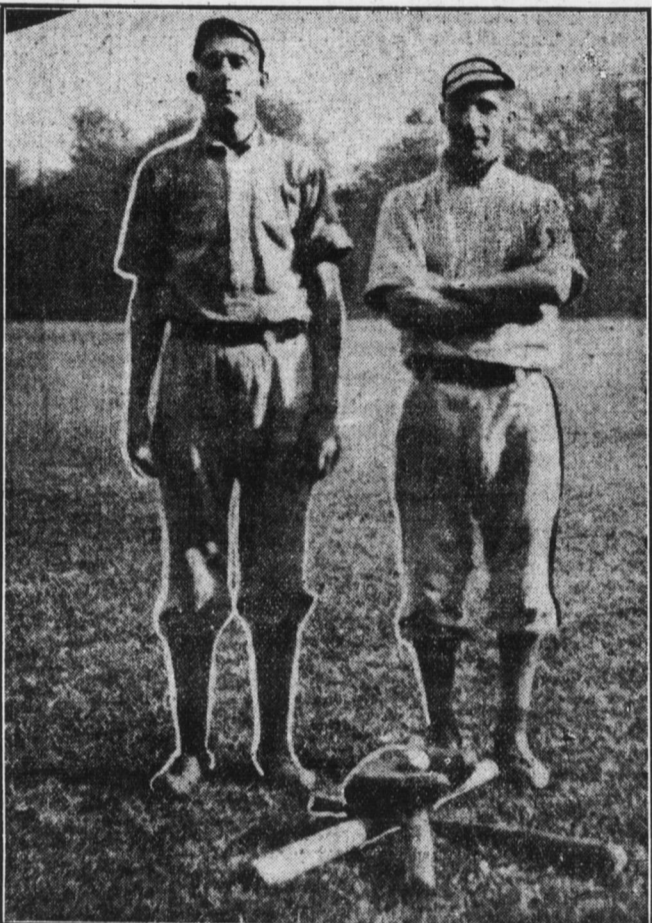
