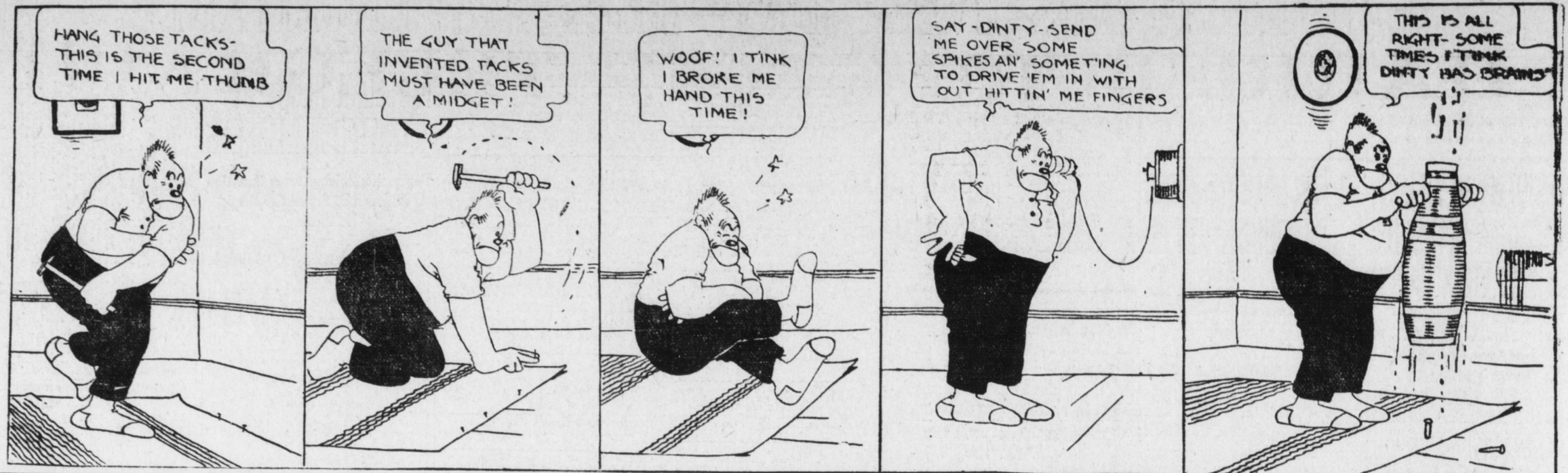

Indianapolis, Ind., May 15.—Caleb Bragg, the real millionaire of the automobile racing game, with twelve millions in cold, hard cash to his credit, has signed to pilot Frank Galvin's Peugeot in the next Indianapolis 500-mile race, Galvin being laid up as the result of injuries received when his car overturned in practice recently.

Bragg is one of the most famous drivers in the game, having won the 1910 grand prize and numerous other contests. Why he should want to drive a racing car, in view of his tremendous wealth, is a mystery.
