The Harrisburg Walking Club is especially interested in the publication of the following article, prepared by the club:

"The State Federation of Pennsylvania Women's Clubs has issued a special number of its magazine known as 'The Messenger' devoted entirely to the urging of universal peace. It requests that every club in its membership hold at least one preparatory meeting before the observance of our National Peace Day, May 18. Also that each club shall join and work earnestly in co-operation with the National organization of the Woman's Peace Party.

It is the voice of the Mother-half of the human race, the ones who suffer more deeply through the horrors of war than the men who endure the physical tortures in the excitement of battle.

"The great awakening of womanhood the world over calls for action. Where our grandmothers wept and prayed to-day we join to our prayers and tears organized propaganda for the securing of peace both in our own generation and for all time to come.

"The Federation urges all of its women to think in terms of peace, to talk in terms of peace and to teach the wisdom and need of peace to the children both in day and Sunday schools. It urges the discussion of the subject at all meetings and the passing of all resolutions to further the cause.

"The established order of the civilization and prosperity of the world is being wiped out before our eyes. There shall be wars and rumors of wars—but the end is not yet. It is for this unknown future that the women of Pennsylvania lead the women of America in this great movement. They are planning a campaign of education of peace, the steady, persistent, quiet kind of work whose influence is always felt.
