

its defeat of the Women Watchers bious distinction of being the only Commonwealth in this country to refuse to pass such a bill when the women asked for its protection to assure a fair vote on the suffrage amendment at the polls. All other States where the question of woman suffrage has been referred to the voterhave granted the women this assurance of fair play without quibble or delay. This was exemplified in the neighboring States of New York and New Jerisque when the legislatures of both these States passed such bills as the members of the Pennsylvania House rejected to-night. "We recognize, however, that this is the action of only a few men and that the thousands of men voters whom these legislators profess to represent, will show their love of fair play by so overwheiming a vote on election day that a greater victory will be accomplished. "The defeat of the bill merely means that our fight for fair play has begun. We shall appeal from this unfair treatment, at the hands of ninety-nine legislators, to the thousands of
