M.—French troops have been landed at Seddi Bahir at the southern tip of the Gallipoli peninsula and on the European side of the Dardanelles, and are now fighting around the Turkish positions at Krithia, according to a dispatch received by the Grecian newspaper Messager D'Athens from Mudros, Lemnos Island. Without doubt the simple blouse is to be the prevailing one for the Spring and for the Summer. Here is a model that is made with a straight collar and can be buttoned up snugly about the throat when the days are cool and rolled open when the days are warmer. In the picture, it is made with sleeves of lace which give a guimpe effect and that treatment is extremely fashionable, but the model can be used with perfect propriety for the blouse of one material made of crepe de chine, of cotton voile, soft crepe or any other fabric that can be made full with success.

For the medium size will be needed 2 1/2 yds. of material 27 in. wide, 1 3/4 yds. 36, or 1 1/2 yds. 44, with 1 3/4 yds. 27, 3/4 yd. 36 or 44 in. wide for the sleeves, to make as shown on the figure; 3 1/2 yds. 27, 2 1/2 yds. 36 or 1 3/4 yds. 44, to make of one material throughout. For the collar and cuffs will be required 3/8 yd. 20 in. wide.

Imperial Naval Reservist Guest of Local Germans

German residents of Harrisburg and Steelton for the past few days have entertained a small unit of the Fatherland's Imperial Naval Reserve, in the person of Franz Muller.

Muller is a member of the crew of the Crown Princess Cecelia, the fast Hamburg-American liner that, with many million dollars' worth of gold bullion in her hold, outrated the British cruisers and eluded capture at the outbreak of the war. This is the boat that left New York and later being lost track of for several days, suddenly appeared in the harbor at Bar Harbor, Maine.

Shortly after this thrilling encounter with the British sea dogs the Cecelia was tied up in the harbor. While the boat is thus interned Muller is taking a trip about the United States. For several days he is visiting the German residents here and left today for Lebanon.

Muller was formerly a member of a German theatrical chorus. While here he sang several solos in the Maennerchor Hall, in North street.
