COMPENSATION IS

THE GREAT THING

Record of the Legislature Shows That It Enacted Many Matters Into Statutes

Workmen's compensation, one of the most important planks of the Republican party in Pennsylvania in many years, looms up as the big achievement of the General Assembly of 1915.

The subject was contained in six bills and a joint resolution proposing a constitutional amendment empowering the Legislature to make the workmen's compensation law compulsory instead of elective, to which it is now restricted by constitutional provision.

Another important measure passed and which is now a law and will become effective on January 1, next is the child labor act which had the backing of the state administration along with the workmen's compensation bills.

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Public Charities Board Two new members were named for the State Board of Public Charities which is to play a big part in the work of the administration.

Banking Commissioner William H. Smith was elected as Executive Controller Samuel C. Todd, James N. Moore, director of the Legislative Reference Bureau, was reappointed.

Dr. John J. Moffitt, of this city, was reappointed a member of the State Dental Examining Board.

E. H. Reppert, Uniontown, was appointed judge of Fayette county, to succeed R. E. Umbel, resigned.

Charles Kolb, Philadelphia, brother of Colonel Louis J. Kolb, was appointed a member of the Suburban Planning Commission to succeed Joseph R. Grundy.

John B. Patrick, Clarion, and John Wanamaker, were reappointed on the Meigs Monument Commission.

Edgar F. Smith, provost of the University of Pennsylvania, is reappointed member of the College and University Council.

W. P. Stevenson, McVeytown, is reappointed a forestry commissioner and J. M. Hoffman, Johnstown, named to the commission.
