By authority of an act of assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "An act authorizing and empowering the city treasurers of the several cities of the second and third class of this Commonwealth to sell to public sale all properties upon which the taxes assessed and levied, are delinquent and remain unpaid," approved March 30, 1913, P. L. 106, I shall expose to sale the following real estate, situated in the city of Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, by vendue or public outcry, in front of the Court House, in said city, on Monday, June 7, 1915, at ten o'clock a. m., and continue the sale thereof until all of said properties are sold, to discharge the delinquent and unpaid city taxes thereon, together with all necessary costs.

BULLISH ENTHUSIASM IN TODAY'S MARKETS

Substantial Advances in All Except Few Unimportant Issues

New York, May 22.—Indications of a renewal of bullish enthusiasm were manifested in today's early stock market, the entire list, except a few unimportant issues, making substantial advances. War shares were again prominent, Bethlehem Steel scoring an initial gain of three points in response to overnight reports that the company had been awarded additional large contracts. Crucible Steel, Lackawanna Steel, Westinghouse and Bethlehem Steel rose 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 points, these gains in many instances being soon increased. Investment issues, like Union Pacific and Reading were in demand at gains of a point or more. United States Steel began with 3,000 shares at a maximum gain of a point and Coppers shared in the move to a like extent.

NEW YORK BANK STATEMENT. By Associated Press. New York, May 22.—The statement of the actual condition of Clearing House Banks and Trust Companies for the week shows that they hold \$150,314,560 reserve in excess of legal requirements. This is an increase of \$7,013,330 over last week. The statement follows: Loans, etc., \$2,418,024,000; decrease, \$10,611,000. Reserve in own vaults (B), \$430,183,000; increase, \$2,781,000. Reserve in Federal Reserve Banks, \$113,591,000; increase, \$757,000. Reserve in other depositories, \$33,895,000; increase, \$2,233,000. Net time deposits, \$131,775,000; decrease, \$1,415,000. Circulations, \$37,971,000; increase, \$33,900. Of which \$38,165,000 is specie. Aggregate reserve, \$582,769,000. Excess reserve, \$150,314,560; increase, \$7,013,330.

Italy Free to Open War Without Formalities. Paris, May 22.—It is considered that Austria's action in destroying the bridges and cutting telegraph and telephone lines at Pont Caffaro and Cedrona can be held to constitute a casus belli, making Italy free to open hostilities without further diplomatic formalities, says a Gaulois dispatch from Turin. Pont Caffaro is a short distance north of Riva, the extreme northern point in Austria on Lake Garda. Austrian troops were withdrawn after the civil population had been forced to evacuate Riva and other sections of Venezia under Austrian rule.
