CIVIL WAR VETERANS TO VISIT SCHOOLS

Memorial Programs to Be Featured by Tales of Those Stirring Days of '61 to '65

More than eight members of the posts of the Grand Army of the Republic, Sons of Veterans and American Veterans of Foreign Service, will be present to-morrow afternoon in the schools of the city to participate in the annual memorial programs.

E. B. Hoffman, chief marshal of the parade on Monday, May 31, will make his appointments to-day, assigning three veterans to each building in the city. Mr. Hoffman and J. D. Saltsman going to the open air school in the West End.

Colonel H. C. Demming and the Rev. J. C. Fornbrook will be at the Central High school to-morrow at 12.15. Mr. Hoffman has issued a special request to clergymen and citizens living near the various schools to join with the veterans each year in the annual visits. In a statement made to-day he said:

"There are many children of foreign nationalities attending our schools. Let us inculcate in them a spirit of true patriotism and reverence for our flag, and for the men that wear the little bronze button, who saved our flag and who, by sacrificing their education and suffering the pangs of war, made it possible for others to receive the benefits. Let us instruct the children to be loyal, patriotic and true to our flag and all it stands for. It's your flag, my flag and our flag, the emblem of liberty that never went down in defeat."

TERRORS OF SERBIAN FLIGHT TOLD HERE

Letter From Officer Relates Suffering of Women and Children

Washington, D. C., May 27.—A terrible picture of the flight of the people of Serbia before the Austrian army is drawn in a letter just received by Miss Helen Lozanitch, of the Serbian Agricultural Relief Committee of America, from her brother, Lieutenant Milivoj Lozanitch, of the Serbian army.

"The Serbians had seen so much from the first Austrian invasion, that when the second came the whole population fled in front of the enemy," he writes. "I have seen a mother carrying two babies in her arms, without shoes on her feet, which were cut and bleeding from the stones; yet she could not stop as she knew that would mean death for her and her children. It was as though the people were fleeing before an inundation.

"I am not exaggerating when I tell you that a mother in a wagon had no time to stop and pick up her child when it fell out. All realized that if they stopped they would be taken. The food gave out on the way and I saw a mother give her baby away to people who had food. I met many lost children."

EIGHT BODIES ON PHILADELPHIA

New York, May 27.—The American line announced to-day that it had received a cablegram saying that eight bodies of persons who perished when the Lusitania sank were aboard the steamship Philadelphia, which sailed last night from Liverpool and is due here next Thursday.

SEES NEW ERA IN POLITICS

Former Governor Herrick Says Businessman, Not Cash, Will Rule

Special to The Telegraph Kansas City, Mo., May 27.—Myron T. Herrick, former Governor of Ohio, and former United States ambassador to France, to-day, addressing a Republican gathering predicted a new era in American politics, which will place politics on a higher and more intellectual plane. He declared that formerly big businessmen wrote checks for campaign purposes for defensive reasons, and thereby gained the right to be consulted and gave them power in the councils of the party.

"In the new era," he said, "the businessman will put personality into politics; he, not his money, will measure his influence. This new era, Mr. Herrick asserted, is evidenced in the activities of commercial and civic organizations and the new personal interest, men of business, and dollars, are taking in public affairs."

The companies were represented by G. C. Taylor, president of the American Express Company, and John W. Newlean, vice-president and comptroller of the Wells Fargo Company. Mr. Newlean spoke also for the Adams, American, Southern and United States companies and asserted that during the year ended January 31 last the companies had rolled up a deficit of more than \$2,000,000.
