International Congress on Safety at Sea. Another question which it is held must be decided is whether or not ammunition and explosives carried in defiance of American laws accelerated the sinking of the ship.

Such is in general the argument of the German government, which may be expected also to display curiosity regarding the fate of the American compromise proposal to end submarine warfare and the American government's effort to induce England to accept them.

With regard to the cases of the Cushing and Gulflight, Germany will point out that she has disavowed repeatedly all intention of harming in offensive neutral shipping even in the war zone and will express her complete readiness to pay compensation for "unfortunate accidents."
