John Wormley, Father of All the Wormleys in U. S., Came From Wurtemberg, Germany

Wormleysburg, Pa., June 5.—Burgess J. Fred Hummel has received the following letter from a grandson of Mr. Wormley: "May 19, 1915.—J. Fred Hummel, I am a grandson of John Wormley, who was the founder of Wormleysburg. I am 62 years of age and my address is Mt. Joy, Lancaster county, Pa. In reply to this tell me, is his old stone house still standing? I have a brother in Elizabethtown, B. F. Wormley, and one in Lancaster, J. W. Wormley. I will try to get up to see you soon. My grandfather was the father of all the Wormleys in United States. He came from Wurtemberg, Germany. Yours, Samuel Wormley."
