

Ousted Rector Bars Door to His Successor

Philadelphia. June 7.—The Rev. George Chalmers Richmond, deposed by Bishop Rhinelander as rector of St. John's Episcopal Church, began open war this morning against the bishop, and the diocesan forces were routed for the time.

Mr. Richmond came to the church about 9.30 o'clock with Robert Keen and Thomas Bozart. He appointed Keen as the outside sentinel, with orders to admit none opposed to the rector. Inside was Mr. Bozart weighs about 200 pounds.

Bishop Rhinelander had appointed the Rev. Henri Motier Gayley Huff as temprary rector, and when he arrived a little late he found Mr. Richmond in fighting mood. Before a large crowd the rebellious rector issued a written ultimatum, defying the bishop's authority.
