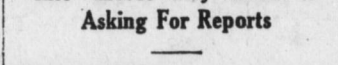
FRENCH ESTABLISH BLOCKADE

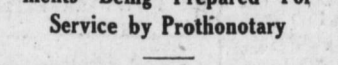

STOCK TRANSFER TAX BILL IS APPROVED

Will Add From \$300,000 to \$400,000 to the Income of the Commonwealth in 1916

The stock transfer tax bill, one of the series designed to raise revenue for the Commonwealth, was approved by Governor Brumbaugh to-day. The act, which becomes effective on January 1, 1916, will add from \$300,000 to \$400,000 to the revenues of the State, according to estimates of State officials, although the income will be governed entirely by the business done. The bill establishes a tax of two cents on each hundred dollars of value or fraction thereof and includes not only sales, but agreements and memoranda of sales or deliveries of shares in any corporation, copartnership, joint stock company or association. It does not tax an agreement evidencing deposit of stock certificates as collateral. The Auditor General is to prepare and issue the stamps for the tax, which stamps must be used on all transfers and must be cancelled. The penalty for
