CAMP HILL PAVING PROGRAM ENDORSED

Voters Expected to Put Measure Through at Special Election on June 19

Camp Hill, Pa., June 9.—Enthusiastic endorsement of the proposed paving of Market street was given by hundreds of voters after a big mass meeting last night which was addressed by men who have been affiliated with public improvement work.

The principal speaker was A. Carson Stamm, of Harrisburg, who reviewed the public improvement work in the last twenty years. He traced the results and said Camp Hill would undoubtedly make as big a stride, comparatively as Harrisburg has.

Burgess James W. Milhouse presided at the big meeting. Other speakers were Charles H. Hagedorn, an engineer of the State Highway Department Robert L. Myers and Warren Keim, members of council.

It was intimated at the meeting that the Riverton Consolidated Water Company and the Harrisburg Gas Company would place larger pipes through the town.

PROTEST AGAINST RUM TRAFFIC WITH PARADE

1,500 Temperance Advocates March Through Borough in Great Demonstration

More than 1,500 people, of which at least 600 were voters, registered their protests against the saloon and the liquor traffic in one of the biggest street demonstrations ever held in Steelton last evening when they paraded down Broad street from Conestoga to the Hills tabernacle.

The parade was headed by Chief Marshal Metzger and Henry Blaker, who were surrounded by a line of members of the W. C. T. U. and about 200 school children, the latter carrying small American flags.
