Now that the regular semiannual spring contest on the Reservoir links between the teams of the Harrisburg Park Golf Club and the Country Club for the Boyd trophy is out of the way, the management of the Park Golf Club is going right ahead to perfect the details for the city championship tournament, which starts at once.
