Most devastating of all are the new Skoda shells of the Germanic allies which are 17 inches in diameter and weigh 2200 pounds. The Skoda howitzer shoots at a high angle and its shell penetrates twenty feet into soft earth before exploding two sec-onds after striking. "When one of these shells hits it means death to everything within a radiance of 150 yards."




