By Associated Press — New York, June 30. — Wall Street — Prices continued to fluctuate irregularly during the first hour with increased activity. Reading, N. Y. C. and Can. Further weakness in foreign exchange exercised a restraining influence. Bonds were heavy.

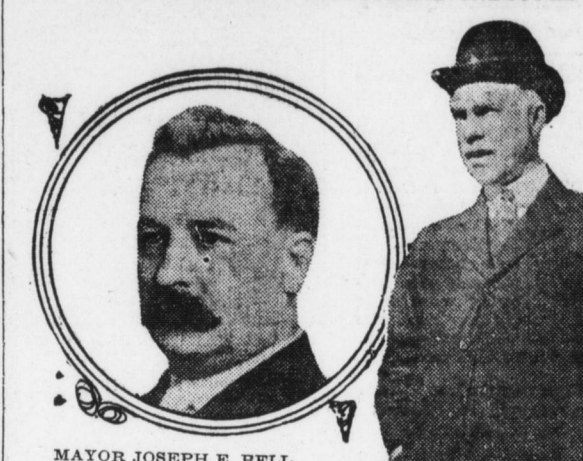

C., June 30. — Official announcement of the most favorable trade balance in the nation's history—more than \$1,000,000,000 for the current year ending at midnight, was made to-day, at the Department of Commerce. It exceeds by nearly \$400,000,000 the best previous record.

THE TEXTBOOK BUSINESS

Greatly exaggerated ideas prevail concerning the total number of textbooks sold in the United States each year and the annual profits resulting from such sales. Confidential data obtained by the United States Bureau of Education from 43 textbook publishers in the United States show that their aggregate total sales of textbooks for use in public and private schools in 1913 amounted to \$1,374,030. The aggregate for public schools, elementary and high, amounted to \$1,121,763.

TWO INDIANA POLITICIANS INDICTED

Thomas Taggart, Democratic national committeeman from Indiana; Mayor Joseph E. Bell of Indianapolis, and more than a hundred others have been indicted in connection with election frauds. Taggart and Bell were among the first to appear at the sheriff's office in Indianapolis and give bonds of \$50,000. Among the charges in connection with the many indictments was that in the recent county primary registration and election certain primary and election boards permitted the destruction of ballots for the purpose of substituting other ballots. Two counts set up a conspiracy to aid and abet primary poll clerks in marking ballots in a manner different from that requested by the voters, while other counts allege the use of money in influencing the electors, both in the primary and in the general election. Paddling the tally sheets for certain candidates in Indiana, while another section of the indictment provides that county charges policemen were permitted to stand within fifty feet of the polls "for improper purposes" in violation of the State law, and that in the State of Texas law requires all children between the ages of 8 and 14 to attend school—sixty days the first year, eighty days the second year, and 100 days thereafter in every school year. It provides for attendance officers, fixes penalties for violations, and provides for the establishment of parental or truant schools where necessary. The law goes into effect September 1, 1915. The South Carolina law is optional, but the State authorities are hopeful that a large proportion of the districts will vote to have the law apply to them. State Superintendent Swearingen is urging the enforcement of the law, and says that his compulsory attendance petition at once, both its election, and put every child in school during 1915-16.
