### Veteran Athletic Infielder Is Now Red Rox Property



Boston. Mass., July 3.—Jack Barry, shortstop, a member of the famous combination known as Connie Mack's \$100,000 infield—McInnis, Collins, sor any and Baker—has been secured by the Red Sox and will join the Boston Club at once.

President Joseph J. Lannin announced the purchase of Barry late last evening. It was a cash transaction, and \$8,000, it is said, was paid for him, although Mr. Lannin stated that he did not care to give the amount of money involved.

Barry will undoubtedly add strength to the Boston team. He has not been playing for the past few weeks on account of a sore hand, but said to day that he would be able to work most any day now—possibly to-day.

The purchase of Barry was made with a view to strengthening the infield of the Boston Club, and he will be placed wherever it is thought he will be the most effective.

Barry figured in four world's championships while with the Mackmen, and would have undoubtedly taken part in a fifth had he not been seriously spiked in the leg which kept him out of the game for two months in 1909, the year Detroit beat out the Macks for the flag after a neck-and-neck race for the rag. The loss of Barry cost the Athletics the pennant that season. for Detroit only beat them out by three games and a half, and many of the games the Athletics lost when Barry was incapacitated were directly due to the weakness of the team at shortstop. In 1910, 11 and 12 Barry was the sensation of the league, and his wonderful work in the series against the Cubs in 1910 caused Charley Comiskey, of the White Sox, to proclaim him the greatest shortstop of the decade.
