**TEACHERS LISTING FOR THE SCHOOLS**  
**Bureau of Vocational Education**  
Has Received Numerous Applications For Places

Officials of the State Bureau of Vocational Education say, that judging from the manner in which applications for admission to the summer training schools for teachers to work in the continuation schools under the new child labor law, the required number will be enrolled by the middle of the month. It is estimated that 500 teachers will be needed for the establishment of these schools, most of all of which will be in the cities. Thus far almost 150 have applied, 115 being registered with the bureau, while others have sent their names to other offices and some direct to the Department of Public Instruction.

The time for closing the lists will come on July 15 and four days later the schools will be opened in Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Scranton, Erie, Altoona and Reading.

### School Board Re-elects All Old Officers For New Year

No change in the personnel of the official staff of the School Board was made yesterday afternoon at the meeting of the directors. The board was in session less than five minutes, and it was probably the only official meeting of any kind that did business. The school code, however, provides for the holding of the election the first Monday in July and the fact that July 5 was not legally Independence Day made it necessary for the directors to get together yesterday. The officers were all re-elected without opposition with the exception of George W. Milburn as school treasurer. He was chosen for the fourth year over George G. Gorges the nominee of Dr. Warner, by a vote of 4 to 4.

Secretary D. D. Hammelbaugh, Clerks Frank C. Foose, Annie M. Miller and Miss Anna L. Brenneman were all re-elected unanimously as secretary, clerks and stenographers, respectively, after they had been commended for efficiency. Calvin H. Koons will be re-elected general repairman, and his assistants will be chosen along with the janitors at to-night's meeting of the board. The question of providing for Mr. Koons' care after the city will be taken up to-night, too, and it is probable that a suggestion for an automobile will be considered. The contractor for work on the Shimmell building will be paid \$1,452.58 for last month's work.

**NEWS OF THE RAILROADS**  
**WANT TO ADVANCE PASSENGER RATES**  
Hearing on Western Roads' Plea Begins Today; 13 States Are Involved

Chicago, Ill., July 6.—The application of forty-six western railroad systems for permission to advance passenger rates went on hearing before Examiner Thurwell at the special Commerce Commission to-day. The hearing is expected to last two weeks. The application will be opposed by railroad commissions of states involved. The case involves passenger rates west and north of Chicago and east of the Rocky Mountains, including the rates in Illinois, Wisconsin, Northern Michigan, Minnesota, North and South Dakota, Iowa, Nebraska, Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma, Louisiana and Texas. It involves also increases between these states and other territory, but not to the coast points. Essentially the request is for a 2 1/2-cent rate in territory where the 2-cent rate now applies, but other rates are involved.

The advance, if granted, would affect 120,000 miles of railroad and it has been estimated that it would bring \$20,000,000 or \$25,000,000 added revenue to the roads. This estimate was based on the assumption that state rates would be permitted to conform to interstate. If the states do not do so, the revenue increase would be approximately half of this estimate, it was said.

The railroads base their claims largely on the contention that passenger rates are not remunerative.
