

RECENT FIGHT ON GALLIPOLI AMONG FIERCEST OF WAR By Associated Press
London, July 13.—Describing last week's battle on the Gallipoli peninsula, the Lamnos correspondent of the Chronicle characterizes it as one of the grimmest engagements of the war. He declares soldiers who had been through some of the flercest fighting in France and Flanders were appalled at the terrible spectacle the battle-field presented the morning after a desperate bayonet encounter in a night battle which was "a veritable night mare of horror."

Hermosa Beach, Cal., July 13. —
William J. Bryan, former Secretary of
State, who is spending a brief vacation
here with his son, issued a statement
to-day in explanation of what he
meant by "unnecessary risk" contained
in his comment in connection with the
last German note. He said:

"Any traveler takes ah unnecessary
risk when he goes into the war zone
on a belligerent ship, knowing that it
is subject to attack by submarine. A
traveler also takes unnecessary risks
when he rides on a neutral ship carrying ammunition.

"I believe that our Government
would be justified in separating passengers from ammunition, but until
this is done, American travelers would
be justified in refusing to take passage on a belligerent ship or a neutral
ship carrying ammunition.

"If patriotism requires a man to
risk his life for his country when his
country is engaged in war it would
to seem to be patriotic for a citizen to
avoid risks that might involve his
country in war."
