The International Sunday School Lesson For July 18 Is "Solomon Chooses Wisdom."—I Kings 3:4-15.

The choice that one man made, and how that choice made him, is opportunely studied at a time when thousands of young people have finished their formal education, and are trying to decide their life work. An impressive fact is that most students leave college and high school without having their vocations determined. I am writing this lesson under the trees at a great students' conference, where several hundred-young men are met with this issue paramount. The occasion is impressive and even tragic. At the chivalrous age, equipped for service these young men are eager to choose the best. Dimly they sense the truth that this time of decision will have consequences not only for themselves, but also for their families and to their posterity. The most momentous fact about life is its choices. So these students throng the platform meetings, the group conferences and classes, and keep wholly occupied the time of the older men who are here for individual interviews. Solomon's problem is the problem of myriads of other young men every year.

In the shop talk of this student conference, Solomon made the "fundamental decision." He elected "an understanding heart," or, as one version has it, pictorially, "a hearing heart." Given that as a basis, all lesser matters would naturally settle themselves. These students who are not certain whether they should be farmers or preachers or engineers or missionaries or lawyeru or Young Men's Christian Association secretaries or or businessmen, are called upon by their leaders first of all to settle whether they are willing to do the will of God for their lives, if they can ascertain it.
