CUUCUMBERS ARE HEALTHFUL

Cucumbers are wholesome enough when prepared in the Swedish style. Slice them very thin and place them in an enameled ware colander with plenty of salt between the layers of the cucumbers. Place on top, pressed down by a flat iron or some other heavy weight, an enameled ware plate. Leave this stand for several hours. It is important to use enameled ware in this case, as any metal may act upon and darken the cucumbers.

Serve the cucumbers with French dressing after removing from the colander. It is surprising to note the amount of white juice pressed from the cucumbers, and even delicate persons may eat them when they have been treated in this manner.
