

School Building Erect ed Nearly Century Ago



Mount Joy, Pa., July 17.—Several miles north of Mount Joy stands the only schoolhouse in Lancaster county which antedates the common or free school system in the county. The building was erected ninety years ago, by subscriptions from the neighborhood, on a lot of ground deeded for school purposes by Abraham Hambright. Among the pupils that attended the school was Mrs. Elizabeth Missemer, the mother of J. R. Missemer, editor and publisher of the Mount Joy Star and News. Mrs. Moses Miller, of Manheim, is the only person now living who attended school in that old building. The schoolhouse is a small, rude log structure, which later on was weatherboarded. After being used for thirty years for school purposes, it was abandoned in 1846, when the present school system was adopted. It was then deeded to Frederick F. Baker, who converted it into a dwelling, for which it has been used ever since.


