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GRADE CROSSINGS
DEFERRED COMMISSION
The Harrington Mills grade crossing over the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western Railroad, at Montrose was the subject of complaint filed with the Public Service Commission to-day by E. H. True, Burgess of Montrose, and F. A. Day, attorney.

DEFERRED COMMISSION
The complaint alleges that the crossing is over a much traveled highway and is dangerous; that the railroad company does not protect it with watchmen, gates or warning bells. The railroad has been ordered to answer the complaint, and Acting Chairman S. Doherty has directed John S. Alney, who resides at Montrose, and who is familiar with the situation, to file a report on the matter. Several accidents have occurred there, and the railroad company will not doubt be ordered to place a bell or erect gates as the inspector may recommend.

DEFERRED COMMISSION
The investigator of accidents of the commission has been advised that the railroad watchman will be instructed at Seward, on the line of the Pennsylvania Railroad. The petition for this protection was filed by the chief burglar, Edward L. L. Hedges, who is particularly interested in the welfare of the school children who have occasion to cross the tracks. He expressed his appreciation for the interest of the commission has taken in the matter.

BOOM IN WAR SHARES
HAS RUN ITS COURSE
New York, July 19.—Indication that last week's boom in war shares had run its course for a time was observed on the resumption of trading to-day. Crucible Steel opened with a decline of 2 1/2, which was soon extended to almost seven points. Other issues in the same class, notably General Motors, Baldwin Locomotive Works, American Locomotive and Westinghouse, lost 2 to 6 1/2, and United States Steel, Saturday's leader, fell a point. At the outbreak of the war, the Allies-Chalmers and National Enameling rose 1 to almost 2 points. The majority of the more representative stocks opened with declines. Reading, Amalgamated Copper and American Smelting being under pressure.
