

The Cardinals and the Federal League team will be combined in St. Louis under the ownership of Philip Ball and his associates in the third team. Detroit and Cleveland will have Federal League teams.

The standing of the Federal League, which will retain its name, has not been definitely agreed upon, but the chances are that it will outrank the American Association, and the Interntional League will fall just below the American and National.

These plans have been under consideration for several weeks and for a time it seemed that the new alignment would go into effect at once. But with the schedules made, it was figured this would be unwise, and so the various leagues decided to carry out their planned programs and start along the above lines next season.
