At one point Commissioner Pennypacker interrupted to ask how the commission's tentative rates compare with existing rates of the Bell company in this State, and was told that the commission rates are so incomplete that the telephone companies do not know how to adjust rates that the commission's schedule does not touch to it. Commissioner Pennypacker also asked a number of questions with a view to getting a direct statement from the telephone company's attorney on the justice and value of the commission's population basis for rate making.
