NEWS OF THE RAILROADS
FREIGHT INCREASES; IDLE CARS GROW LESS
Further Return of Good Business Shown in P. R. R. Traffic Reports

Pennsylvania Railroad freight traffic continues the steady increase inaugurated by the return of good business some time ago.
The number of loaded cars passing eight representative points during the first seven days of the month amounted to 172,652, compared with 167,251 for the corresponding period a year ago, an increase of 5,301 cars or 3.2 per cent.
The daily average shows 24,650 cars against 23,893 in 1914. The car movement past Lewistown Junction, both east and westward, during this period totaled 22,176 cars, compared with 22,345 last year, an increase of 3.7 per cent.
That the eastward traffic movement has been great may be judged from the fact that of the total number of cars bound east and west the eastward traffic accounted for 17,686 cars.
The number of idle cars on railroads throughout the entire country decreased more than 11,000 between July 1 and August 1. On the latter date there were 264,243 cars out of use compared with 275,636 on July 1 and 186,665 on August 1 of 1914. This decrease has been chiefly felt in coal and gondola cars in the East and in box cars in the southeast and central parts of the country. The surplus of idle box cars has increased in the central north.
