





Make a syrup with the sugar, and some of the water in which the pears were boiled, add to this syrup lemons sliced very thin, use about one lemon to each six pounds of fruit. Boil the syrup until thick, then add the pears, and simmer until they are crear. Pack fruit into jars, and pour the syrup covar.—September Mother's Magazine.
