Treasurer Young Sets Aside Big Sums Received From Hunters' License Act

Over half a million dollars has been set aside by State Treasurer Young from the general funds of the State Treasury as special funds established by the last Legislature, all to be devoted to game purposes and payment of bounties for the killing of de-structive animals and birds. A short time ago \$161,000 was set aside to establish the State fire insurance fund and the Treasurer is preparing to cre-ate the workmen's compensation in-surance fund. When this action is taken there will be seven funds in the

taken there will be seven funds in the treasury.

The money set aside in the last few days is all revenue from hunters' licenses. The sum of \$303,200 was allotted for game preserves, feeding, protection, distribution, purchase and propagation of game and \$240,220.47 to reimburse counties for bounties paid for noxious animals and birds. These two sums represent the income from hunters' licenses prior to April 15, 1915. The revenue from such licenses received since April 15 will be put into a fund subject to appropriation by the next Legislature.

The establishment of funds has considerably depleted the amount of cash in the State Treasury available for payment of schools and for other purposes.
