

Records to Date Indicate Busy Month; Heavy Business on Middle Division

1914. The daily average movement for the first week increased 757 cars, or 3.2 per cent., and for the second week it increased 2,088 cars, or 8.7 per cent. making the average daily increase for the fourteen days 1,419 cars, or 6 per The movement past Lewistown Junction was 47,772 cars, an increase 5,437 cars, while the total movement on August 14 was 6,023 cars, indicating a greater movement toward the end of the period.

P. R. R. Stockholders Reach New Record Total

The rush of coal to storage yards, including Harrisburg and Enola, is bringing a big increase in freight movement on the Pennsylvania railroad. The car movement over the Middle division has been quite heavy for August.

The number of Pennsylvania Railroad stockholders on July 31 was 93,786, a record total. In Pennsylvania there were 32,924 stockholders, in New York 15,976, in New England 16,361, in foreign countries 11,900 and scattering 16,625. At the close of July 31, there were 78 more foreign hold ers than on July 31, 1914. The total number of stockholders in that period increased 3,427. The number of women stockholders on July 31, ignit, was 45,254, which was equal to 45.25 per cent. of the total number.
