Chief of Erie's Fire Department Is Dead

Erie, Pa., Aug. 20.—John J. McMahon, chief of the Erie fire department, died early to-day from injuries received two weeks ago in the Mill creek flood. Chief McMahon while attempting a rescue in the flood area was swept away and for a time his name was listed with the dead. Several hours later he was found floating in a mass of wreckage and taken to a hospital. He was severely injured and a few days ago developed typhoid pneumonia. He had been chief of the fire department since 1893.

Local police are looking for the man who robbed the house of Mrs. R. E. Reese, New Cumberland, during her absence, taking \$80 after ransacking the house.




